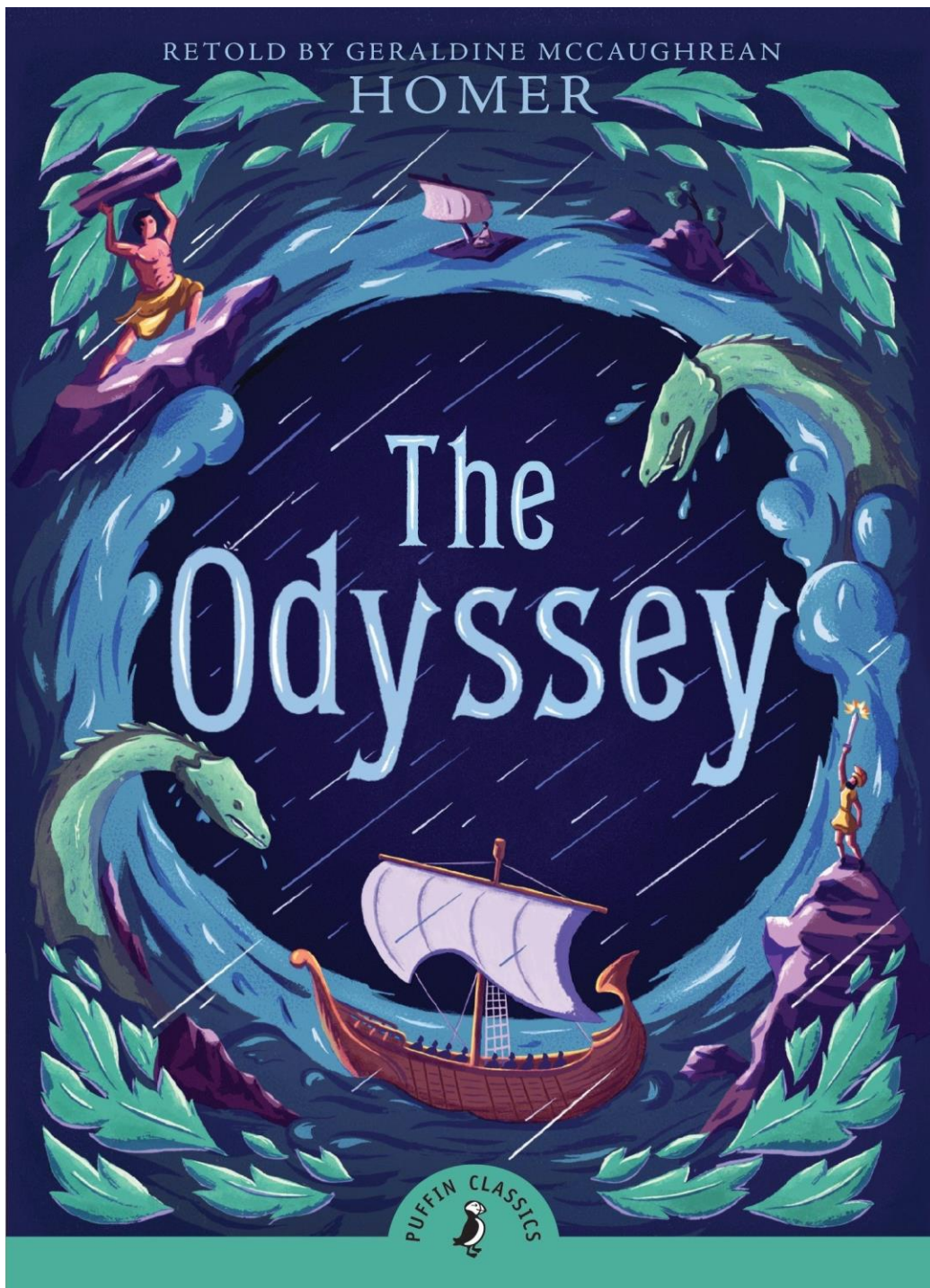

Characters in the Odyssey

Mortals (this means when you don't live forever)

- **Odysseus:** King of Ithaca and hero of Troy
- **Polites:** Odysseus' best friend
- **Penelope:** Queen of Ithaca and wife of Odysseus
- **Eurylochus:** one of Odysseus' men
- **Telemachus:** Odysseus' son

Creatures, monsters and others who Odysseus meets on his journey home

- **The Lotus Eaters:** Island people who feed visitors deadly fruit
- **Polyphemus:** a cyclops
- **King of Aeolia:** a kindly, curious King
- **Circe:** a sorceress
- **Tiresias:** an Oracle (someone who sees the future)
- **Siren Singers:** vile creatures who appear to sailors as beautiful women with bewitching voices
- **Scylla:** a six headed serpent
- **Calypso:** a sea nymph
- **King Alcinous:** the rich and powerful king of Scheria
- **Argos:** the faithful hound



Who's Who?

Gods in myths and legends

In the *Odyssey* you'll meet many of these Greek Gods, such as Zeus and Poseidon. Others, you may know about already from Primary school, or your own personal interest.



Zeus is considered the ruler, protector and the father of all Gods and humans. In statues and in stories, he is often portrayed as an older man with a beard and a lightning bolt in hand.

Hera is the Goddess of women, marriage, family and childbirth in the ancient Greek religion. She is one of the Twelve Olympians.



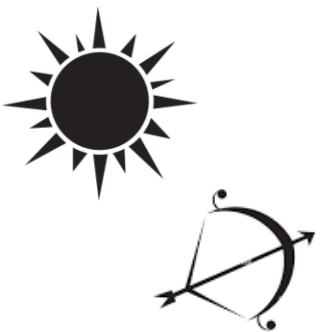
Hermes is the God of trade, thieves, travellers as well as the guide to the Underworld. He is known to be quick and cunning and act as a messenger between Gods and mortals.

The God of the seas, water, storms and hurricanes, earthquakes and horses is **Poseidon**. His symbols include the trident, horse and dolphin.



Demeter is the Goddess of the harvest, nature and the seasons. She is often more commonly worshipped as a Goddess of the Earth.

Athena is the Goddess of wisdom and warfare. She is the daughter of Zeus, and her symbol includes an owl.



Twins **Apollo** and **Artemis** have different responsibilities. The God **Apollo** is the God of light, the suns and the arts, whereas his twin **Artemis**, is the Goddess of the hunt, protection and childbirth.

The God of war and violence is **Ares**. It is said that all other Gods despise (hate) him, except for **Aphrodite**.



Aphrodite is the Goddess of love and beauty, and her symbols include the dove, swan and rose.

Last but not least, **Hephaestus** was the master blacksmith for all of the Gods.

Enjoying the book so far? Here are some of the books we'd recommend reading if you are enjoying this genre or learning about Greek Myths and Legends.

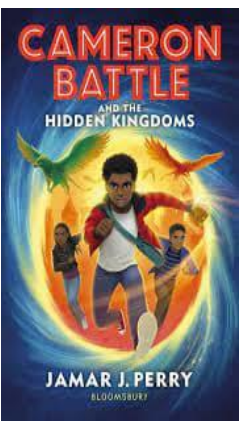


Who Let The Gods Out by Maz Evans:

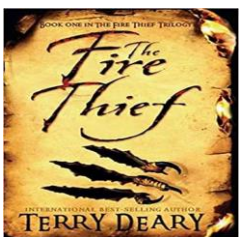
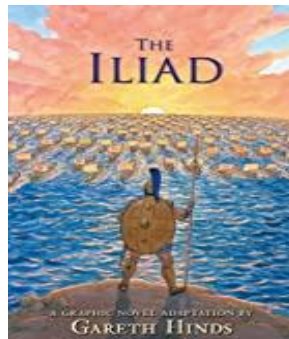


Cameron Battle and the Hidden Kingdoms by Jamar J. Perry

Cameron Battle grew up reading *The Book of Chidani*, cherishing stories about the fabled kingdom that cut itself off from the world to save the Igbo people from danger. Passed down over generations, the Book is Cameron's only connection to his parents who disappeared one fateful night, two years ago. Ever since, his grandmother has kept the Book locked away, but it calls to Cameron. When he and his best friends Zion and Aliyah decide to open it again, they are magically transported to Chidani. Instead of a land of beauty and wonder, they find a kingdom in extreme danger, as the Queen's sister seeks to destroy the barrier between worlds. The people of Chidani have been waiting for the last Descendant to return and save them ... is Cameron ready to be the hero they need?

The Iliad - Graphic Novel adapted by Gareth Hinds

A crisis point in the Trojan War - Achilles, hero of the Greeks and leader of the ferocious Myrmidons, smoulders in anger against Agamemnon, the most powerful of the Greek leaders. As long as Achilles refuses to fight, the Greeks are destined to fail, pushed back ever further from the stronghold city of Troy by Hector and Paris' Trojan army. Above the fighting on Mount Olympus, the gods watch on, each allied to a different warrior and each willing to extend the hand of divine intervention to ensure their success...

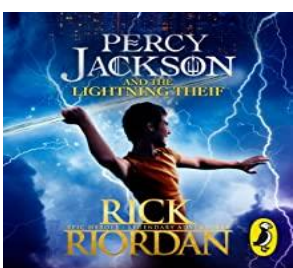


The Fire Thief by Terry Deary

Inkheart by Cornelia Funke

Meggie loves stories, but her father, Mo, hasn't read to her since her mother disappeared. When a stranger knocks at their door, Mo is forced to reveal an extraordinary secret - when he reads aloud, words come alive, and dangerous characters step out of the pages. Suddenly Meggie is living the kind of adventure she has only read about in books, but this one will change her life for ever ...



Percy Jackson and the Lightning Thief by Rick Riordan

Half boy. Half God. ALL Hero. I was just a normal kid, I went to school, played sports and hung out with my best friend. Until I accidentally vaporized my maths teacher. Now, I spend my time at Camp Half Blood, battling monsters and generally trying to stay alive. And now that Zeus thinks I've stolen his lightning bolt, staying alive is going to be even harder....

Amari and the Night Brothers by B. B. Alston

Amari Peters knows three things. Her big brother Quinton has gone missing. No one will talk about it. His mysterious job holds the secret...
